




Providing affordable, tailored credit is critical to maximizing their potential and ensuring economic prosperity is shared broadly.

ndia is on an ambitious path towards achieving a remarkable \$10 trillion economy, with the vision of Viksit Bharat at its core. This profound journey hinges critically on dramatic advancements in mobility and connectivity, which are essential to fuel economic progress. While a robust infrastructure serves as the backbone of this vision, the civil aviation sector emerges as the crucial circulatory system that facilitates rapid, efficient, and inclusive growth across diverse economic sectors. At present, civil aviation contributes approximately 1.5% to India's GDP, and it has generated around 7.7 million jobs, both directly in aviation and indirectly through allied services, showcasing its vital role in the nation's economic growth.

The Connectivity Imperative: Regional to Global Hubs

Effective and high-speed connectivity is essential for economic integration. Government initiatives, such as the UDAN scheme, have played a key role in linking Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, unlocking hidden demand and promoting balanced growth across the nation. It is now important to expand this success in regional connectivity to a global scale. India must focus on developing its metropolitan centers such as Delhi, Mumbai, and Bengaluru into self-sufficient international aviation hubs. By investing in these key Indian hubs, the country can stop relying on foreign hubs in the Middle East and Southeast Asia for passenger and cargo traffic. This shift will not only allow India to retain significant economic value but also create high-value jobs and establish the country as a crucial player in global supply chains.

Tax Rationalization: The Core of Global Competitiveness

To achieve global competitiveness, fundamental tax reforms are essential. A primary focus should be on inclusion of Aviation Turbine Fuel (ATF) within the framework of the GST. Currently, ATF is subjected to state and central taxes, which contrasts sharply with most global peers. By rationalizing this tax structure, operating costs would be significantly lowered, making air travel more accessible, stimulating growth in passenger volume, and allowing airlines to free up capital for essential investments in fleet expansion and infrastructure.

Building Domestic Capability: Maintenance and MRO

Beyond operational costs, policy streamlining is essential for building a robust domestic maintenance ecosystem. Historically, the Maintenance, Repair, and Overhaul (MRO) sector in India was constrained by 18 percent GST rate. This high taxation often forced Indian airlines to send their aircraft overseas for essential maintenance, resulting in a significant outflow of foreign exchange and loss of highly skilled job opportunities. However, the government's decision to reduce the GST rate on MRO activities to 5 percent, along with the provision for full Input Tax Credit (ITC), has been a transformative move. Additionally, introducing a

uniform 5 percent IGST rate on imported parts has further enhanced the situation. These strategic policy changes are already positioning India as a global MRO hub, maximizing the potential of the country's abundant engineering talent and attracting international business from neighboring regions.

Sustaining Future Growth and Resilience

To ensure the long-term resilience of the aviation industry, a comprehensive approach that includes

fleet modernization and the pursuit of sustainable aviation solutions is essential. Additionally, a stable regulatory environment that supports multiple players in the market is crucial for benefiting consumers. As India moves toward its ten trillion-dollar economic goal, the aviation sector's ability to efficiently transport people and high-value goods globally—supported by rationalized taxation and world-class infrastructure—will be vital to the nation's success.

Strengthening India's global presence is equally critical. Encouraging companies to expand internationally, integrate into global value chains and leverage cross-border





ourism is not only a leisure activity but a significant economic sector that provides employment to millions, supports local development, and strengthens cultural exchange. The sector stands at an important juncture. Domestic tourism in India continues to expand, while international arrivals are recovering but have not yet fully regained their pre-pandemic levels. As competition for travellers intensifies and preferences evolve, Economic Reforms 2.0 must place tourism at the centre of India's growth strategy. The country's heritage, geography, and diversity provide a strong base, but translating this into measurable economic outcomes requires structural reform rather than incremental change.

Reimagining Incredible India Playbook

The Incredible India campaign-built visibility but must now adapt to a digital environment where travel decisions are influenced in real time. India needs a data-driven, always-on communication approach that connects its varied tourism products to specific traveller segments. The current allocation for global marketing in the Union Budget limits the scale of this effort, especially when peer destinations continue to invest at pace.

Simplifying Licensing and Compliance for Hotels

In several states, hotel projects require close to 100 separate licences and approvals from different departments. These include multiple clearances for land use, building safety, food service, and entertainment, often sought through uncoordinated processes. The absence of a centralised tracking system or automatic escalation when deadlines are missed adds further uncertainty for investors. Establishing a tourism-specific single-window clearance system, integrated with digital monitoring and clear accountability, can reduce duplication, improve transparency, and accelerate project execution. Simplifying licensing is critical to attracting new investment, scaling branded accommodation, and improving the overall competitiveness of India's hospitality sector. A similar approach is needed for homestays, where a streamlined and predictable registration framework can encourage wider participation by micro-entrepreneurs and expand accommodation supply across smaller destinations.

Improving Last-Mile Experience1

India's national and state highways have improved considerably over the past decade, expanding regional access and reducing travel time across major corridors. However, the last-mile experience, linking travellers from highways and transport hubs to key attractions, still lags behind global peers. Coordinated investment and planning across transport, urban development, and tourism departments can help close this gap by improving connectivity and on-ground infrastructure, ensuring that travel within and around destinations is seamless.

Establishing Carrying-Capacity Norms

India's most visited destinations, hill stations, beaches, and heritage sites, are experiencing growing pressure from unregulated visitor flows. Overcrowding strains infrastructure, impacts the environment, and diminishes the quality of experience. Introducing destination-level carrying-capacity norms and using digital tools for monitoring and crowd management can help balance access with sustainability.

Developing New Destinations

The Union Budget's announcement to develop 100 new tourist destinations is a timely initiative that recognises the need to diversify India's tourism portfolio. The success of this effort will depend on the quality and pace of implementation. Each new destination should be developed against measurable standards for safety, sustainability, and visitor experience, with a focus on long-term viability rather than rapid construction. Linking central assistance to adherence with these benchmarks will ensure resources translate into globally competitive destinations.

Digital Integration through a National Tourism API

India's tourism assets remain distributed across multiple ministries and state systems, resulting in fragmented information and inconsistent traveller experience. A National Tourism API can address this by digitally linking ticketing, entry permits, passes, and payments for monuments, national parks, and other attractions. Integrating these systems under a common framework, with UPI-enabled transactions and real-time availability, will simplify access for travellers and enable better data-driven management for authorities. It can also open opportunities for private platforms to innovate around discovery, itinerary planning, and visitor services.

Tourism has the scale and linkages to contribute meaningfully to employment generation and regional development. With coherent policy, digital integration, and simplified regulation, it can become a central pillar of Economic Reforms 2.0 and a key driver of inclusive, future-ready growth for India.

GST 2.0: Paving the way for a simpler, growthoriented tax regime he introduction of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) in 2017 was a transformative milestone for India's taxation landscape, replacing multiple state and central levies with a unified national framework. The recent reforms (GST 2.0) announced at the 56th GST Council meeting reaffirm the government's commitment to fostering economic growth, streamlining compliance, and enhancing investor confidence through a more transparent and efficient tax structure.

I. Impact on India Inc

GST 2.0 reforms usher in a new era for Indian businesses, promising to reshape the operational landscape for companies across sectors. By focusing on rate rationalization, compliance simplification, and legislative clarity, these reforms are designed to address longstanding challenges faced by India Inc.

- (a) Rate rationalization: Stimulating demand: Reduction in GST rates lowers the overall cost of goods and services for consumers, making products more affordable and increasing their purchasing power. This boost in consumer demand encourages higher sales volumes, which in turn benefits businesses by driving revenue growth. As businesses experience increased demand, they may expand operations, invest in new products, and create more job opportunities, further stimulating economic activity. Overall, a reduction in GST rates can create a positive cycle of increased consumption and business growth, contributing to broader economic development.
- (b) Simplified compliance: Advancing ease of doing business: While GST has already unified indirect taxes, dismantled inter-state trade barriers, and reduced the cascading effect of multiple levies, businesses have continued to grapple with complex compliance requirements and frequent classification disputes. GST 2.0 directly addresses these challenges by introducing a simplified two-rate structure, rationalizing rates for key sectors, and prioritizing faster refunds and efficient dispute resolution. These reforms are designed to reduce uncertainty, lower compliance costs, and improve the ease of doing business, thereby supporting better capital planning and strengthening India's global competitiveness. Clearer tax classifications and correction of inverted duty structures are also expected to boost domestic value addition and exports.
- (c) **Legislative clarity:** Minimizing litigation and reducing costs: A significant change has been brought with respect to 'intermediary' service provisions, which had previously led to disputes regarding the export status of certain services. By explicitly recognizing these as exports, the reforms resolve longstanding ambiguities and enhance the global competitiveness of Indian service providers, supporting India's ambition to become a leading exporter of services. Additionally, proposed amendments related to discounts and tax adjustments, along with recent circulars, simplify the treatment of post-sale discounts and credit notes, creating a more business-friendly environment.

II. Other key focus areas

- (a) **Empowering MSMEs:** Strengthening the backbone of the economy: GST 2.0 is particularly advantageous for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), which form the backbone of India's economy. By simplifying compliance, rationalizing tax rates, and expediting refunds, the reforms address many operational challenges faced by MSMEs. The streamlined GST registration process, especially for small and e-commerce sellers, lowers entry barriers and encourages compliance. Faster, automated refunds will help MSMEs maintain healthier cash flows, easing working capital constraints. Clearer tax classifications and the correction of inverted duty structures will also reduce disputes and compliance uncertainties, enabling MSMEs to focus on growth. These measures are expected to enhance MSME competitiveness, facilitate their integration into supply chains, and empower them to contribute more robustly to economic growth and job creation.
- (b) Trust-based approach **Formalizing** economy: A hallmark of the latest reforms is the transition from an enforcement-centric approach to a trust-based tax administration, leveraging technology, data analytics, and selfcompliance. This evolution signals a maturing tax environment in India, where compliance is increasingly seen as a standard business practice rather than a regulatory burden. The government's decision to phase out anti-profiteering provisions reflects growing confidence in businesses to voluntarily pass on benefits to consumers, nurturing a culture of trust and accountability.
- (c) Other macroeconomic benefits: At a macro level, the reforms reflect a strategic approach to balancing immediate fiscal needs with long-term revenue stability. By broadening the tax base and improving compliance, the government aims to ensure steady revenue growth. Rationalizing tax rates will

help bridge the gap between the organized and unorganized sectors, accelerating the formalization of the economy. These changes are set to foster a more inclusive and dynamic economic environment, laying the groundwork for sustained, consumer-driven growth.

III. The Road Ahead: Realizing the full potential of GST

GST 2.0 marks a significant step toward a simpler, more transparent, and growth-oriented tax system.

Looking ahead, further opportunities for simplification remain. Bringing sectors such as Aviation Turbine Fuel (ATF) and Natural Gas under the GST umbrella should also be prioritized to further unify the tax base and create a level playing field across industries.

There is a scope of liberalizing the input credit provisions by allowing expenses incurred on the construction of factories and other capital assets, employee welfare and so on.

Sharper focus on reducing the 'cost of doing business' by allowing cross-utilization of CGST and SGST credits across states and refund of unutilized input taxes improve business cash flows nationwide. On the administrative front, having a mechanism for single registration and 'faceless audits' are areas to work upon.

By embracing these forward-looking measures, GST can evolve into a truly unified and efficient tax system, serving as a powerful catalyst for India's ongoing economic transformation.

To summarize, GST 2.0 is a major step forward in making India's tax system simpler, fairer, and more supportive of growth. By focusing on lower rates, easier compliance, and a trust-based approach, the reforms are expected to benefit businesses of all sizes, especially MSMEs. As the government continues to refine the system, GST is set to play a key role in driving India's economic transformation in the years to come.

The Reserve Bank of India's State of Economy report for Q3 2024 highlights an economic recovery driven by strong festive activity and rural demand, with projected Real GDP growth of 6.8% for the quarter. And RBI recently concluded (Aug- Sep 2025) consumer confidence survey has reported optimism across urban and rural populations(CSI values have marginally improved). The Future Expectations Index (FEI) showed increase as well.

Reports from late September and early October 2025 indicated that the Durga Puja economy in West Bengal was estimated to have reached up to ₹65,000 crore. Separate set of reports, highlighted, India's Navratri 2025 sales hit the highest in over 10 years, supported GST reforms that lowered tax rates and boosted consumer demand. From cars to electronics and retail segment reporting sales growth between 25% and 100%, marking a record-breaking festive season as aspirational India consumer led the surge.

Diwali is expected to continue the momentum as it is being anticipated by reports that Diwali festival sales are poised to cross a record Rs 4.75 lakh crore. Analysts and reports indicate that total Indian festive e-commerce sales are expected to reach around ₹1.2 lakh crore (\$14.4 billion), with Flipkart and Amazon being the primary drivers.

As India marches towards to its US\$ 5 trillion economy goal, the festive season will continue to drive India's growth prospects, promoting digital skills, regional entrepreneurship, and rising aspirations. This is a time not only for celebration, but for recognising momentum built by millions across the country. India's festival economy is a powerful testament to how tradition and cultural celebration can become a core engine for national economic growth. ASSOCHAM has been a platform of trust and handholding that has been voicing the matters to enable a sustainable business hub. 

Economic Reforms 2.0 – Future Ready India

n 2025, India has embarked on a fresh cycle of structural reforms aimed at strengthening resilience, boosting consumption, and modernizing regulatory frameworks. These reforms are being rolled out amid global headwinds-notably increased U.S. tariffs on Indian exports-and are intended to reposition India's economy toward sustainable, inclusive growth.

A centerpiece of the reform agenda is the 'next generation' GST overhaul, which seeks to simplify and rationalize the tax structure. In September, the government merged earlier GST slabs by eliminating the 12 % and 28 % rates, reducing the number of standard rates to four: 0 %, 5 %, 18 %, and 40 %. The move is intended to ease tax burdens on essential goods, stimulate consumption, and partially cushion the blow of rising external trade pressures.

More broadly, the government announced the formation of a task force for next-generation reforms, tasked with revising outdated laws, reducing regulatory burdens on business, and aligning India's legal and institutional framework with 21st century needs. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has affirmed his vision of "arsenal of reforms" that will unfold across sectors to lower friction in doing business and enhance competitiveness.

Deregulation is emerging as a central theme of the 2025 reform push. According to commentary in The Economic Times, India is entering a 'reform moment' akin to 1991, but the focus this time is less fiscal shock and more removing red tape, easing regulatory costs, and unlocking private investment.

These structural steps come against a backdrop of macro stability. India's GDP grew by 7.8 % in Q1 FY 2025-26, signaling underlying momentum. Fiscal discipline has also improved: the fiscal deficit in FY 2024-25 stood at 4.8 % of GDP, helped by slower government expenditure growth.

In sum, the current wave of reforms reflects India's ambition to leverage its domestic strengths—consumption, entrepreneurship, a youthful workforce—in an uncertain global setting. If executed effectively, these changes could lay the foundation for a more dynamic, resilient Indian economy in the decade ahead.

A key driver of this shift is the rapidly evolving Indian capital market, which plays a crucial role in shaping the nation's future.

The market has undergone significant regulatory reforms, technological advancements and increased participation. SEBI has introduced measures such as simplifying the IPO process, implementing the T+1 settlement cycle, enabling direct listings for retail investors, enhancing regulations for investment advisors and introducing digital platforms for regulatory filings. These initiatives align with the government's vision of a transparent, globally competitive financial market.

Reforms like the GST, Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC) and new tax regulations have boosted investor confidence. This, along with India's growing digital infrastructure has led to a surge in retail investors, making the market more inclusive. As a result, investor confidence has surged, with more than 13 crore unique retail investors participating in equity markets as of FY25, contributing to ₹8.8 lakh crore in equity demand. While equity markets have matured significantly, the fixed-income segment is also evolving.

Outstanding corporate bonds stood at ₹53.6 lakh crore in 2025, growing at a 12% CAGR since 2020. The municipal bond market has started gaining traction with ₹15,000 crore raised in FY25 to support urban infrastructure. Reforms around credit enhancement, bond index funds, digital bond platforms and debenture trustee regulations are aimed at strengthening this ecosystem. India's corporate bond market is projected to double, reaching ₹100 lakh crore by 2030 as long-term capital from pension and insurance funds is mobilized.

India's capital markets have also expanded beyond traditional equities and bonds, introducing a range of innovative investment instruments. Alternative Investment Funds (AIFs) have grown exponentially, with assets under management rising from $\stackrel{?}{\sim}1.5$ lakh crore in 2018 to over $\stackrel{?}{\sim}10$ lakh crore by 2025. Similarly, As of September 2025, Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs) and Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) now manage combined assets of $\stackrel{?}{\sim}9$ lakh crore, offering investors access to incomegenerating infrastructure and real estate projects. These are projected to grow to $\stackrel{?}{\sim}8-9$ lakh crore by 2030. The introduction of Electronic Gold Receipts (EGRs) has also enabled formal, liquid and regulated investment in gold with digital gold expected to grow at a 20% CAGR through 2030.

The rise of Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) investing is another notable shift. SEBI now mandates Business Responsibility and Sustainability Reports (BRSR) for the top 1000 listed companies, driving corporate accountability. India's

The mutual fund industry has also experienced tremendous growth, driven by rising financial literacy, digital access, and investor education campaigns. Total Assets Under Management (AUM) have nearly doubled from ₹27 lakh crore in 2020 to ₹55 lakh crore in 2025. Systematic Investment Plan (SIP) inflows have reached ₹28,2650 crore per month with 9.11 crore active folios. Passive investing is gaining traction as well, with ETFs and index funds expected to account for over 30% of total AUM by 2030 offering low-cost & diversified exposure.

On the global front, India continues to attract robust foreign capital. FDI inflows touched \$84 billion

in FY25, led by investments in manufacturing, green energy and fintech sectors. The country's recent inclusion in the JP Morgan GBI-EM index is expected to bring in \$25–30 billion in passive inflows over the next 18 months. The development of GIFT City and relaxed Foreign Portfolio Investor (FPI) norms are helping India emerge as a modern international financial centre, enhancing cross-border investment opportunities.

Looking ahead, India's capital market transformation under Economic Reforms 2.0 reflects a future-ready vision that emphasizes innovation, sustainability, inclusivity and global competitiveness. With continued policy support, investor trust and technological advancement, India is well on track to become one of the world's most dynamic financial markets.

Many processed food items, essential nutrition products, packaging materials, and logistics have moved into lower GST slabs (5% or even nil) from higher rates. This change reduces input tax burdens, corrects "inverted duty" cases (where raw materials were taxed higher than finished goods), lowers production and freight costs, and ultimately helps bring down retail prices. The new GST changes are expected to benefit consumers by reducing tax inefficiencies and improving affordability. A streamlined regime ensures that the advantages reach end users while supporting farmers, small enterprises, and food processors. This reform will make healthy, safe, and quality food more accessible to all.

Labor and factory law reforms under the newer codes such as the Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions Code, and state-level amendments (e.g. allowing flexible working hours, safer night shifts for women, better compliance mechanisms) likewise improve operational flexibility. They can lower compliance cost, reduce delays, and increase workforce availability. These allow food product manufacturers to scale up capacities, invest in R&D, improve safety and quality standards without being bogged down by overly rigid labor constraints.

The combined effect: lower costs, more efficient production, higher investment, improved supply chains, increased rural outreach, and stronger returns for both industry and communities. Together, these reforms lay the foundation for an economy that is efficient, equitable, and future-ready, where industries thrive, consumers benefit, and India's growth is powered by both progress and purpose.

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
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

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
